Since the main objective of an observation hive is to watch the bees, place it in an area where you will see them regularly.

You can't see normal bee activity during routine inspections, but an observation hive lets you see what the bees are actually doing, including the queen's activities.

It is also a good indicator of what is going on with other hives in your apiary.

There are many designs: the main common property is that they have clear sides so you can see the bees. You can buy or build your own.
